Welcome to General Conference 2012

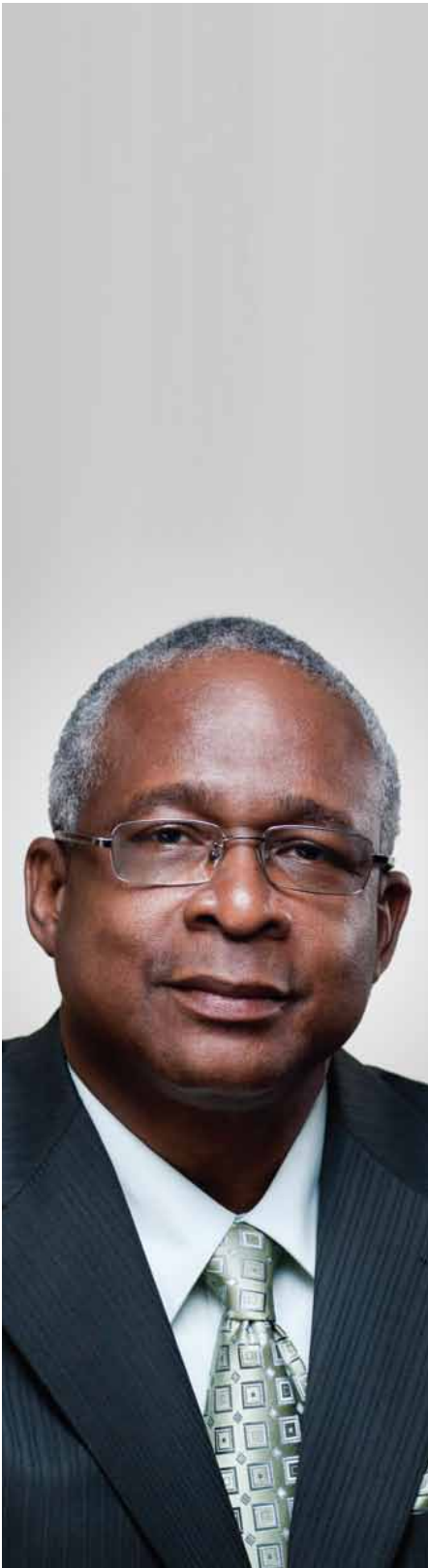

Apostle Dr. Sydney Stair, Th.D

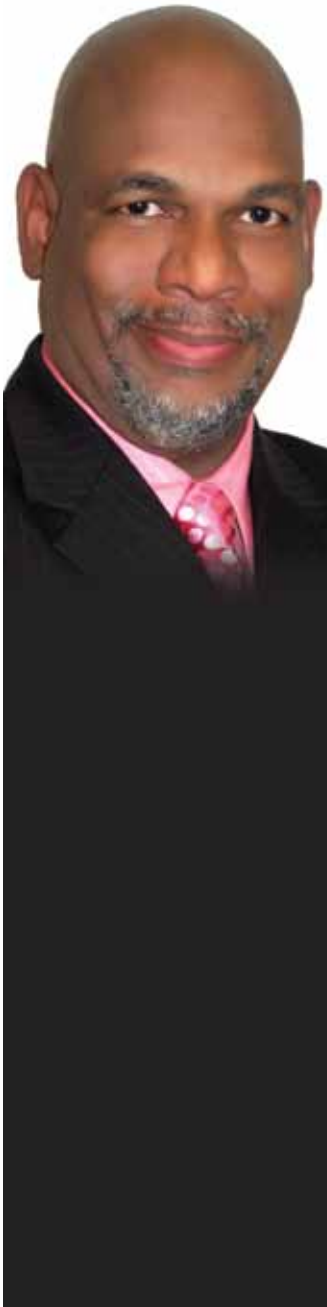
Dr. Stair is the Founder and Senior Pastor of the House of Worship, Inc. on the Island of Puerto Rico. Dr. Stair gives spiritual covering to churches both nationally and internationally. Born in the Republic of Panama in Central America, he was ordained into the ministry in 1987.

Dr. Stair holds two Bachelor's degrees, one in Christian Counseling and the other in Theology, a Master's degree in Biblical Counseling, a Doctoral degree in Theology and Pastoral Ministry, and an Honorary Doctorate in Divinity.

Dr. Stair is fluent in Spanish and English. He has served as a missionary in five different countries and has been to over seventy-five nations on five continents. He travels extensively throughout the world, teaching and preaching at conferences, seminars, workshops, retreats and churches. In addition to ministerial work, he influences the secular world as he is a motivational speaker for the banking industry and for the governments of Puerto Rico and Panama.

He is currently the President of the Council of Apostles, Prophets and Elders (C.A.P.E.), Director of Centro de Consejería Avance (Advance Counseling Center), Co-founder and representative of the "Caribbean's for C.A.L.", i.e. (The Coalition of Latin American Apostles), President of C.D.A. PLENARY SESSION

“The Gay and Lesbian Agenda”

Within the last twenty years or so gays and lesbians have posed a major threat to Christianity and to society as we know it in the Western World. In the early decades of their rise to significance their main focus was on recognition of them as a legitimate entity in the moral and religious compass of society. Their agenda at that time was to achieve acceptance of them as “differently normal” people. However, over time they have metamorphosed into a group who are seeking to offer their lifestyle not only as a viable alternative to the heterosexual lifestyle, but to take over the main avenues of power. These include the government, educational institutions, churches, charities, and so on. “The Gay Manifesto” is a multi-faceted document which sets out in some detail their agenda, and includes advice to their followers on how to defend themselves through training in and the use of firearms; stock-piling food and other essentials against hurricanes, wars, and so on; and using their votes to elect chosen candidates to high governmental positions. In other words, they are seeking to offer a counter-culture to the Western world in particular which would eliminate the Christian culture as we know it that has been the basis of Western society. At the same time they pretend that they are the real Christians and that their interpretation of the Bible is the only authentic one.

COUNTRY PROFILE: TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO

The Republic of Trinidad and Tobago is an independent twin-island state located south of the of the Caribbean archipelago, lying just off the coast of Venezuela. The country covers an area 5,128 square kilometres (1,980 sq mi) and consists of two main islands, Trinidad and Tobago as well as numerous smaller isles. Trinidad is the larger and more populous of the main islands.

With a population of approximately 1.3 million, Trinidad and Tobago is a cosmopolitan country comprising descendants of settlers from Europe, West Africa, Asia, South America and the Middle East, as well as those of the indigenous Amerindians that preceded them. The country is multi-religious with the largest religious groups being the Roman Catholics and Hindus. Other religious groups include Anglicans, Muslims, Methodist, Presbyterians, Shouter or Spiritual Baptists, the Orisha faith (formerly called Shangos), Seventh Day Adventist, Jehovah Witness. Based on the 2000 census the fastest growing religious groups are the Evangelical and Pentecostal churches. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has also expanded its presence in the country since the mid-1980s, so too has Unity, Bahai and Christian Science.

According to the 2000 Census, 29.6% of the population was Roman Catholic, 34.3% Protestant (including 8.9% Anglican, 7.8% Pentecostal, 4.5% Seventh-day Adventist, 3.8% Presbyterian or Congregational, 8.2% Baptist, and 1.1% Methodist), 25.6% Hindu, and 6.6% Muslim. A small number of individuals subscribed to traditional Caribbean religions with African roots, such as the Spiritual Baptists; and the Orisha, (0.1 percent). The smaller groups were Jehovah's Witnesses (1.8 percent) and unaffiliated (2.2 percent). There is also a small, but active, Jewish community on the island. Trinidad and Tobago is most noted for its Carnival and development of the musical genres of calypso and soca. Additionally, Trinidad and Tobago holds the distinction of being the birthplace of the steel pan, the only musical instrument to be created in the 20th century.

Possessing large oil and gas reserves, a well-developed petro-chemical industry and a rapidly developing manufacturing sector, Trinidad and Tobago is considered to be the "economic tiger" of the Caribbean region.



TRAVEL

Trinidad and Tobago's national airline, Caribbean Airlines, in addition to major international destinations, operates return flights between Piarco Airport (in Trinidad) and Arthur N.R. Robinson Airport (in Tobago). The country is also serviced by other airlines, including Aeropostal, American Airlines, LIAT, COPA Airways, Suriname Airways and British Airways. The main airport of Trinidad is the Piarco International Airport. The airport code used is POS.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

Ground transport from airport to the 5 conference hotels and return will be provided. Based on completed forms, representatives of the Conference Planning Committee will meet all fully paid attendees of the Conference upon their exit from the customs area of the airport. Transport will be provided to the various evening events organised by Conference for all participants staying at any of the five conference hotels

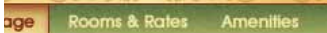

Information on the Type A North American/Japanese 2-blade Electrical Adapter Plug and Electrical Outlet

The Type A electrical plug, or flat blade attachment plug, uses two flat parallel pins or blades. It is found in most of North America and on the east coast of South America on smaller devices that do not require a ground connection.

Information on The Type A Electrical Outlet

Technically known as the NEMA 1-15 (North American 15 A/125 V ungrounded), this simple plug has two flat parallel pins, or blades. Early designs allowed the blades to be inserted either way, but more modern plugs make the neutral blade wider than the live blade so that a polarized plug can only be inserted one way. New polarized Type A plugs will not fit in old Type A sockets, but both old and new Type A plugs will fit into new Type A and Type B sockets. A similar plug and socket are commonly found in Japan, the JIS C 8303, Class II (Japanese 15 A /100 V ungrounded). It is basically identical to the North American, but incorporates stricter dimensional requirements for the plug housing, marking, and mandatory testing and approval. Japanese plugs should be able to fit North American outlets, but North American polarized plugs may require adapters or replacement non-polarized plugs in order to connect to older Japanese outlets.
